My experience of Clinical Trials

- Variety of Clinical Trials, all linked to Cardiovascular Disease or Stroke Health
- Level of involvement varies from review mid trial to being involved in the whole trial journey from design to trial start
- Never been invited to analyse or review results, and only rarely get sent findings or trial outcomes





How Patients Can Contribute to the Appraisal of Results

- Patient-Reported Outcomes (PROs) E.g, Pain levels, fatigue, mood changes, and overall well-being.
- Participating in discussions about trial results and helping to interpret data that may directly impact our care.
- Engagement in Decision-Making
- Advocacy for Real-World Relevance
- Ensuring that the findings from trials truly reflect patient needs

Benefits of Patient Involvement in Clinical Trial Appraisal

More Accurate Result Interpretation:

 Patient input helps contextualize clinical outcomes, making them more relevant and actionable.

Increased Trust in Research:

 When patients see that their voices are heard, trust in the trial and its results are strengthened.

How can patients be better involved?

- Education and Empowerment:
 - Providing patients with the tools to understand trial results
 - Training programs to improve health literacy
- Partnerships with Research Teams:
 - Collaboration between patients, researchers, and healthcare providers to interpret findings
